

A message for parents and carers from Public Health Salford regarding Measles.

Measles cases are increasing in England due to children being unvaccinated.

Measles spreads very easily among those who are unvaccinated, especially in nurseries and schools. It can be a very unpleasant illness and in some children can be very serious and lead to hospitalisation.

Having the MMR and MMRV vaccine is the best way to prevent serious illness.

Two doses of the vaccine gives lifelong protection against measles, mumps and rubella. The MMR/MMRV vaccine is given at one year old and again at either 18 months or three years and four months (depending on their DOB) in readiness for starting school.

**We urge parents to check their child's MMR immunisations are up to date with both doses by checking your child's immunisation record (Red book) or by contacting their GP surgery.**

If your child is not vaccinated, please contact your GP for an appointment.

Anyone can get measles if they haven't been vaccinated so if you as parents and carers are not vaccinated we would urge you to book an appointment.
